#### Thought for the Month, from our Rector, the Revd. David Wintle.

There is a wonderful story in St Luke's Gospel about the impact that Jesus made on the life of a tax collector named Zacchaeus. In those days, taxes were imposed by conquerors on the people they had defeated, and tax collectors didn't get paid a salary; they took a cut (often more than they were supposed to) from the tax they collected. Zacchaeus was a Jew, working for the hated Romans, who had conquered his country, taking money from his fellow-lews and getting rich.



Zacchaeus couldn't see over the heads of the crowd that gathered when Jesus came to his town, so he staked out a spot in the branches of a tree. He was keen to get a clear view of Jesus, but of course that meant Jesus could see him too, and Jesus called Zacchaeus down and invited himself to dinner at Zacchaeus' house.

Jesus' visit changed Zacchaeus. His heart was touched; his whole life was altered.

He became a different person. Greed was converted into generosity, as he vowed to give half his belongings to the poor. Past dishonesty was countered with restitution, as he offered to pay back four times the amount to anyone he had cheated.

Zacchaeus's behaviour must have been the talk of the town. Word got around that his encounter with Jesus was the reason for it all. The story was still being told 50 years later, when Luke wrote it down. It was obvious to everyone that meeting Jesus changed Zacchaeus.

They may not have known exactly what he believed, but they saw the difference it made to life.

What about those of us here and now who call ourselves Christians and say that we follow Jesus? Has our encounter with Jesus made a difference not just to what we believe and how we think,

but to what we do and how we treat people? Can people see from our behaviour how we have been changed?


#### Come and enjoy breakfast in **BUBBENHALL** Village Hall!
