

#### **Children in Church**

Although we do not at present have the resources to run regular services for children at Bubbenhall, we love having children in our churches, and there is always provision for them at the 9.30 a.m. services at Ryton.

All families with babies and children are sure of a warm welcome whenever they can join us.

All Ryton Sunday morning services start at 9.30 a.m., and the pattern is:



#### 2nd Sunday in every month: Village Worship.

The most informal of all our services.

We start in the Church Centre (warm and welcoming) with workshop activities for children, and coffee, puzzles and chat for grown-ups to get to know one another.

At about 10.00 we move into church for a short and child-centred service.

There is no need to be there on the dot of 9.30- people drift in as soon as they can make it.

#### 4th Sunday in every month: Family Service.

An all-age service of readings, songs and activities with everybody young and old in church together.

Children always participate in the readings/ drama sketches etc. and several people bring instruments to accompany the songs. (and any other musicians among you and your children would be very welcome to join them)

Tea/coffee and cake after the service in the Church Centre.

#### Ist and 3rd Sundays in every month: Parish Communion with Sunday School.

Tea/coffee and the chance to socialise after every service.

Children start the service in church with their parents, and after the first hymn go out for Sunday School activities in the Church Centre, returning to receive a blessing at the time of Communion.

Parents are welcome to accompany their little ones to Sunday School and stay with them if they lack confidence at first.

At these services, we also have a robed choir which includes older children (aged about 8

### Queen's 90th Birthday Quarter Peal

As part of the Coventry Diocesan Guild's mammoth attempt to ring 90 quarter peals in 90 towers for the Queen's 90th birthday celebrations (one of which was completed at St Giles, Bubbenhall), we are pleased to share with you the response from the Palace as follows:

#### Letter from Her Majesty's Lady in Waiting

The Queen wishes me to thank you for the kind message which you sent on the occasion of Her Majesty's ninetieth birthday.

The Queen has been deeply moved by the wonderful response to her milestone birthday, and was touched to hear that you were attempting to ring 90 quarter peals in 90 towers, with the final quarters coinciding with the lunch for patrons on the Mall on 12<sup>th</sup> June.

Her Majesty greatly appreciated your kind thought in writing as you did, and hopes that you will understand that, because of the overwhelming number of messages received, it has not been possible to reply to you until now.

#### THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH:

From our Rector, the Revd. David Wintle.

Many of us struggle to see God amidst the desolate headlines.

Many of us wonder where God is in our own private pain of broken relationships, lost loved ones, loneliness, illness, job loss, or depression.



Or maybe it's just that we get so caught up in the day-to-day routine of making ends meet that we have a hard time imagining that God could possibly make a difference in our world. Maybe we believe in God in a general sort of way, but the idea of sensing God's presence – let alone seeing God – in our mundane lives seems a bit much.

When you get down to it, the Gospel message of hope, grace, and peace seems rather improbable, even unlikely: I mean the idea that the Creator of the cosmos would even know we exist, let alone love and cherish us. It's almost too good to be true.

Perhaps the problem is not that it is impossible to see God, but rather that we tend to look in all the wrong places. Rather than speculate about God's existence, we should instead look to Jesus. And when we do that, we encounter the God who became flesh, taking on our lot and our life so that we might have hope. And Christmas is the time when we focus on that very thing – Jesus coming into our world to shine God's light on us all.

We all know the Christmas story, so I won't repeat it here, but we need to do more than simply tell it again; we need to meditate on it, to take it into ourselves, so that it seeps into the dark crannies of our soul, into those places where the world's darkness seems so much more prominent than the light. Because that's what this story is for - not just to give us a nice warm feeling in the coldest part of the year, but to shine light in dark places, to bring hope to the discouraged, insight to the lost, and the promise of peace to all who long for it.

#### .... and finally... Christmas safety notices



I. All members of the congregation planning to dash through the snow in a one horse open sleigh, going over the fields and laughing all the way are advised that a Risk Assessment will be required addressing the safety of an open sleigh for members of the public. This assessment must also consider whether it is appropriate to use only one horse for such a venture, particularly where there are multiple passengers. Please note that permission must also be obtained in writing from landowners before their fields may be entered.

- 2. To avoid offending those not participating in celebrations, we would request that laughter is moderate only and not loud enough to be considered a noise nuisance.
  - 3. Benches, stools and orthopaedic chairs are now available for collection by any shepherds planning or required to watch their flocks by night.


While provision has also been made for remote monitoring of flocks by CCTV cameras from a centrally heated shepherd observation hut, all users of this facility are reminded that an emergency response plan must be submitted to account for known risks to the flocks.





4. The angel of the Lord is reminded that, prior to shining his/her glory all around, s/he must confirm that all shepherds are wearing appropriate Personal Protective Equipment to account for the harmful effects of UVA, UVB and the overwhelming effects of Glory.

5. Following last year's well-publicised case, everyone is advised that Equal Opportunities legislation prohibits any comment with regard to the redness of any part of Mr R Reindeer. Further to this, exclusion of Mr R Reindeer from reindeer games will be considered discriminatory, and disciplinary action will be taken against those found guilty of this offence.





6. While it is acknowledged that gift bearing is a common practice in various parts of the world, particularly the Orient, everyone is reminded that the bearing of gifts is subject to Hospitality Guidelines and all gifts must be registered. This applies regardless of the individual, even royal personages. It is particularly noted that direct gifts of currency or gold are specifically precluded, while caution is advised regarding other common gifts such as aromatic resins that may evoke allergic reactions.

 Finally, in the recent instance of the infant found tucked up in a manger without any crib for a bed, Social Services have been advised and will be arriving shortly.
