The service is for and on behalf of everyone in the three parishes. It will remain on St Leonard's Facebook page for the foreseeable future, so you will be able to catch up with us any timeeven if you couldn't be with us at 10am.

From the Rector, the Revd. David Wintle:

Until recently, the Bishops have said that nobody is allowed in church to pray, but since last Sunday the rules have been relaxed slightly. It is now possible for a minister to enter the church to pray or to conduct a church service, and he or she may be accompanied by one other person if that person comes from the minister's own household. The term "minister" in this case of course includes

clergy, Readers and other accredited lay ministers, but "minister" also covers anyone who leads a church service for the purpose of recording it or streaming it. I hope that is clear. It is a small step, but it is a hopeful sign that if everyone continues to do what the government says and "stay alert", it may be the first step towards opening our churches.

Holy Communion will continue to be celebrated in the benefice each Sunday, so the living and the dead will be prayed for at the altar, and from now on will be live-streamed from St Leonard's Church, Ryton, every Sunday at 10.0 a.m. Do join us if you can.



You can use this prayer to make an act of spiritual communion, uniting yourself with Christ's offering of himself:

Dear Guardian Angel, go for me to the church, there kneel down at the altar for me.

At the Offertory, take me to God and offer Him my service: What I am, what I have, offer as my gift.

At the Consecration, adore my Saviour truly present, praying for those who have loved me, for those who have offended me, and for those now deceased, that the blood of Jesus may purify them all.

During Holy Communion bring me the Body and Blood of Jesus uniting Him with me in spirit, so that my heart may become His dwelling place.

Plead with Him, that through His sacrifice all people throughout the world may be saved.

When the service ends, bring home to me and to every home, the Lord's blessing. Amen.

"Not being able to get to church or any





Thought for the Month . From our Rector, the Revd. David Wintle



Back in 2014, Provost Williams School in Ryton held a special RE Day concentrating on the Lord's Prayer.

Near the end of the day I was with Year 6 (that's top Juniors to some of you). The teacher showed on YouTube a song called "I believe" – not the number by the Bachelors, for those of us who are old enough to remember it.

This was a song about creation, accompanied by clips taken from David Attenborough TV programmes like "Life on Earth" and "The Blue Planet".


The tagline of the song was "When I look at all the wonders of creation, that makes me believe in God". I asked the children if they agreed. Almost all of them said "Yes", but one said "No". So we had a good discussion about the difference between knowledge and belief – for example, you and I both know quite a lot of facts about the wonders of the natural world, but it might be that I believe in God and that you don't. Just now we might be finding it very hard to believe that the natural world is entirely good, or even neutral.

On Trinity Sunday, which this year is the first Sunday in June, we hear in church – or we read in the pewsheet - the ending of Matthew's Gospel, with those famous final two verses that are known as the Great Commission – "Go out make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and Lo, I will be with you to the end of the age". It would be nice if we could get to that bit without having to deal with the verse just before it: "When they saw him, they worshipped him, but some doubted".

Those disciples didn't have to get their heads around difficult stuff like Creation or the Trinity. They had no need to because Jesus, risen from the dead, was standing right there in front of them. They could hear his voice; they knew it really was him. But still some doubted.

Matthew probably knew exactly what he was doing when he preceded the Great Commission with the observation that at least some of the early disciples struggled with their belief. Maybe he was reminding us that we should always be mindful and respectful of those who are struggling with doubt.

Maybe he was telling us that if we too struggle with our faith from time to time even the disciples who had Jesus right there in front of them found believing difficult. It takes courage to acknowledge that faith isn't easy. But faith and doubt are two sides of the same conversation, a conversation that won't happen at all unless we are honest with ourselves and with others.

We have registered with a scheme to recycle printer ink cartridges to raise funds for the church.


There is a recycling box at the back of church, so if anyone has any used cartridges they can use the box to send them free of charge. The church will receive £1 for each

And where is Jesus, this strange Easter Day?

Not lost in our locked churches, anymore

- On Maundy Thursday, we remembered how Jesus, the night before he died, set an example of service by washing his disciples' feet and said: I have set an example for you,

- Corona means "crown". Jesus wore a crown of thorns on Good Friday.
