A Message from the Rector, the Revd. David Wintle.

I'm writing this on 12 January, and I am aware that it's very difficult to know in these uncertain times what to say to people when one has to say it two or three weeks before it appears in print: I sent a cautiously optimistic letter to some parishioners just before Christmas, and between posting it and it arriving on people's doorsteps the new variant of Covid was announced and what I had written was out of date. I don't even know whether the churches will be open or closed by the time you read this.

But then, uncertainty is probably the biggest thing most of us have to cope with right now – except of course for those of us who have been directly affected by the virus. When you end up in the supermarket with people pushing past you and leaning across you and handling all the goods, then fear and resentment and anger well up, partly because you know you're taking a risk, but you just don't know how much of a risk. More people are adopting a look-after-yourself-first attitude. You don't feel you can trust people who aren't in your bubble.

Yet at the beginning of all this there was a strong community response to the pandemic; we remember clapping the carers, and the people in Italy coming out on to their balconies to sing and play music, and how we felt a sense of shared joy. Yet we soon got weary of that; it began to feel less like something we wanted to do than something we had to do, and anyway, clapping seemed to be not enough somehow. So we ended up not even clapping. Someone tried to rebrand it as “clap for heroes” a week or two ago and it just didn’t take off this time around.

It’s really difficult to keep it up because we are physically dislocated from each other, but paradoxically that isolation is something which connects us; it’s something we all share. Our experience should make us more, not less, aware of how interwoven we are; even though we are not physically close, we are all connected.

Father James Martin, a Jesuit priest and writer from New York, said this almost a year ago: “This virus is no one’s fault. We still have the fundamental Christian responsibility to love people and not treat them like dirt. Lots of things have been cancelled by the coronavirus, but love is not one of them.”

Let us pray for all who are sick, and for those who are dying, and for their families and friends, for all the people who have died and for their bereaved friends and relatives, as well as doctors, nurses, caregivers and scientists and all those working hard to combat the disease, for essential workers taking risks every day, for governments and local authorities and their advisors making difficult decisions, and for those whose excessive caution or recklessness frustrate us or frighten us.

On Christmas Eve, the Bubbenhall Crib service was held on Zoom.

Craig had arranged the Crib (see picture) and we were able to use it as a backdrop to our Zoom service, to remind us all how it looks in normal times, and will hopefully look again next Christmas.

As far as possible, we followed the normal pattern of our crib services, joining in the familiar carols and with a good number of children enthusiastically answering my questions and showing figures from their family crib sets, as well as some specially made and coloured-in cutouts, which were sent out before the service.

A total of £100 was collected on-line for the Children's Society, and some of this was Gift-Aided, which will have increased the amount available to the Children's Society to help their invaluable work to help the plight of vulnerable young people; work which lockdown has made even more urgent.

The Ryton Crib Service was held outdoors, on the Rec.



About 50 people, adults and children, gathered on the Rec. in socially distanced groups for a short service with carols and Bible readings. It was almost the only opportunity in the village for people to sing carols together this year and it was much appreciated by those who came. A collection was taken in aid of church funds. At the end of the service, members of the congregation placed lights in front of the crib, and almost all of them remained alight until the crib was taken down on Twelfth Night: it was a striking and moving sight throughout the Christmas period. We are grateful to Geoff and Ba Marsh for creating the amazing crib silhouette, and to the Parish Council for allowing us to use the Rec. for our service.

A message from PCC Treasurer, David Hollway:

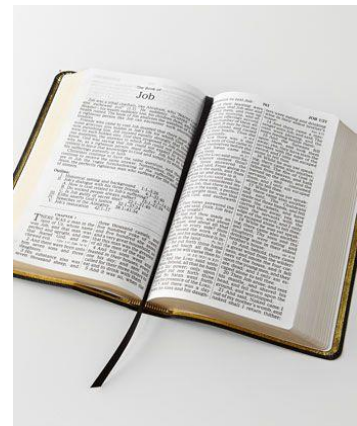

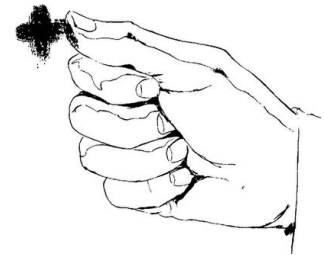
Lent Group- on Zoom this year.

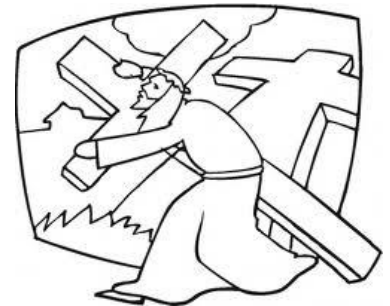
February 17: Ash Wednesday

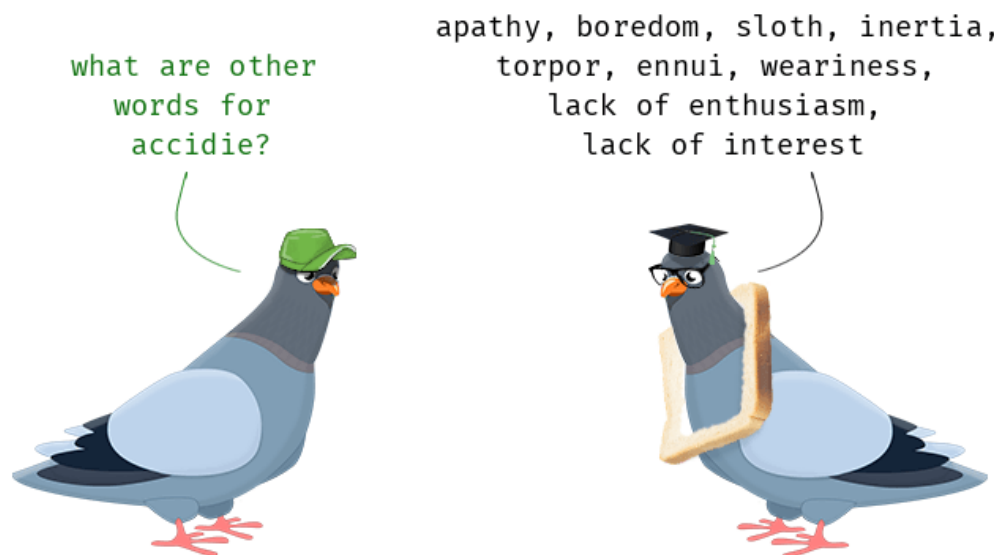


Thought for the Month: “Can’t be bothered” : Accidie.

Last week, I was chatting on the phone to a friend about the things that were going on (or rather NOT going on), in our locked-down lives. I noticed that, when my friend suggested something I might be occupying myself with, I replied: “Oh, I just can’t be bothered.”

“That’s not like you!” she said, but that’s how I felt at the time, and I think it’s a symptom that has overtaken many of us during this difficult time.

Yes, I thought to myself, there’s a technical word for that, and it’s ACCIDIE (Usual English pronunciation is Accidee, like accident with a different ending) It’s akin to depression, but it’s a mood, not an illness.



Well, it’s quite a surprise to find Accidie listed among the Seven Deadly Sins, which are (let’s remind ourselves) :

Lust, Gluttony, Greed, Accidie (also translated as Sloth) Anger, Envy und Pride.

This list was put together by a medieval Pope, and I’m sure, if we put our minds to it, we could think of other sins, perhaps more relevant to us un our age, to add to or substitute for, some of the sins on the list. What about cruelty, for example? Or intolerance?

And I was wondering: Is Accidie really a sin, or is it not rather something- a mood- that's not your fault, like an accident, something that befalls you and there's not much you can do about it? It's clearly more than sloth, more than mere laziness.

You can do something about your laziness, but the apathy of Accidie is something else, something that just sneaks up on you and it's not easy to pull yourself out of it by your own bootstraps, as it were.

Lent is fast approaching, and it's time to examine our conscience and repent of our sins. We might choose to do so in the light of the list of the Seven Deadlies. But Accidie?

Well, if you think of a sin as something naughty that you've done, maybe it isn't. But if you define sin as something that cuts you off from God, well, maybe it is after all.

A prayer: Lord Jesus, you resisted the temptations of the Devil in the wilderness, be with us when we are stuck in the wilderness of apathy. AMEN.

Children in church.



Although we do not at present have the resources to run regular services for children at Bubbenhall, we love having children in our churches, and there is always **(when circumstances once more allow) provision for them at**

the 9.30 a.m. services at Ryton. The information below outlines our normal pattern of services- to be resumed when more normal times return!

All families with babies and children are sure of a warm welcome whenever they can join us. All Ryton Sunday morning services start **at 9.30 a.m.**, and the pattern is:

2nd Sunday in every month: Village Worship. TEMPORARILY ON ZOOM at 11.00

The most informal of all our services.

We start in the Church Centre (warm and welcoming) with workshop activities for children, and coffee, puzzles and chat for grown-ups to get to know one another.

At about 10.00 we move into church for a short and child-centred service.

There is no need to be there on the dot of 9.30- people drift in as soon as they can make it.

4th Sunday in every month: Family Service.

TEMPORARILY ON ZOOM at 11.00

An all-age service of readings, songs and activities with everybody young and old in church together.

Children always participate in the readings/ drama sketches etc. and sometimes people bring instruments to accompany the songs. (and any other musicians among you and your children would be very welcome to join them)

Tea/coffee and cake after the service in the Church Centre.

1st and 3rd Sundays in every month: Parish Communion with (in normal times) Sunday School.

Tea/coffee and the chance to socialise after every service.

Children start the service in church with their parents, and after the first hymn go out for Sunday School activities in the Church Centre, returning to receive a blessing at the time of Communion. Parents are welcome to accompany their little ones to Sunday School and stay with them if they lack confidence at first.

At these services, we also have a robed choir which includes older children (aged about 8 and upwards) and teenagers: anyone whose son/daughter likes singing might consider encouraging them to join the choir.
