By then we hope to have returned to something like normal after Covid, and to celebrate that, and the return of singing in church and the restoration of our beautiful church organ.


The Church Centre will be open from 2pm-4pm for tea and coffee and cake. Come and try out our comfortable new chairs!

After this there will be a service in church at 4.30pm, when we hope to have plenty of opportunities to sing.


As well as thanking God, we will remember all those who have been affected by Covid, especially those we have known and loved who have died, or who continue to suffer the effects of the disease.


Hopefully it won't be too long before we can meet again in church.

#### **Children in Church.**

We love having children in our churches, and there is (in normal times) always



a.m. services at St. Leonard's Church, Ryton. All families with babies and children are sure of a warm welcome whenever they can join us. Families from Bubbenhall are especially welcome. All Ryton Sunday morning services start at 9.30 a.m., and the

#### pattern is:

### 2nd Sunday in every month: Village Worship.

The most informal of all our services. We start in the Church Centre (warm and welcoming) with workshop activities for children, and coffee, puzzles and chat for grown ups to get to know one another. At about 10.00 we move into church for a short and child-centred service. There is no need to be there on the dot of 9.30- people drift in as soon as they can make it.

### 4th Sunday in every month: Family Service.

An all-age service of readings, songs and activities with everybody young and old in church together. Children always participate in the readings/ drama sketches etc. and several people bring instruments to accompany the songs. (and any other musicians among you and your children would be very welcome to join them) Tea/coffee and cake after the service in the Church Centre.

## Ist and 3rd Sundays in every month: Parish Communion with Sunday School.

Tea/coffee and the chance to socialise after every service. Children start the service in church with their parents, and after the first hymn go out for Sunday School activities in the Church Centre, returning to receive a blessing at the time of Communion. Parents are welcome to accompany their little ones to

Sunday School and stay with them if they lack confidence at first.

At these services, we also have a robed choir which includes older children (aged about 8 and upwards) and teenagers: anyone whose son/daughter likes singing might consider encouraging them to join the choir.

## Thought for the month: From our Rector, the Revd. David Wintle.



Like a surprisingly large number of inventions, Superglue came about by mistake. In 1942, Harry Coover was trying to make a plastic gunsight, but his new compound stuck to everything before setting hard, so he gave up.

In 1951, his colleague Fred Joyner was trying to find another military use for the new plastic, this time to make canopies for

jet aircraft. He decided to test it out as a glue, and the rest is history.

Superglue has so many uses. Many hospital A and E departments have reason to curse Superglue and be thankful for it at the same time; for every person who mistakes Superglue for eye drops or glues their fingers to both halves of a saucer, there is someone with a wound which can be held together by

Superglue without using stitches. Watch out with cotton fabric, too; if you spill Superglue on it, it might catch fire, and some have suffered bad burns as a result. I once managed to incinerate a pair of trousers by trying to remove Superglue from them with a solvent.

On the other hand, if you find yourself in the wilderness without matches, just put Superglue on some cotton wool and stand back, and you will have a fire in no time.

In the Letter to the Colossians, the writer says: "In (Jesus) all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together." Colossians 1.16-17, if you want to look it up.

Jesus is the Superglue for the whole universe and everything that is in it. He didn't only make all things; he maintains all things too. He holds everything together. That's a big claim to make about a Jewish man who lived about 2000 years ago. But Jesus is more than that. He is the only-begotten Son of God. God didn't just create everything and set it going, and then stand back to see what would happen; moment by moment he keeps it in being: if he didn't hold it together it would cease to exist altogether.

And God isn't just an impersonal force like gravity or the strong nuclear force: even though he created everything, in Jesus God entered His own creation as a helpless baby. He experienced our world. He didn't need to do that for <a href="https://himself-nemade-everything-ev



Jesus made us, and if we are broken only he can put us back together again. If you have found him and you know him – stick to him like glue.






Both services at Ryton Church, but at the moment they are having to be held on Zoom, and start at 11.00 a.m.
