Wroth Silver ceremony.

Breakfast afterwards at the Queen's Head, Bretford.

This is said to be Britain's longest running annual ceremony being recorded as 'ongoing' in 1086 and on this site since 1170.

The ceremony takes place at the stone, the base of an old wayside cross, on the mound at the top of Knightlow Hill every 'Martinmas Eve before sun-rising'.

That means on 11 November every year just at first light the Wroth Money is collected from the parishes of the Hundred of Knightlow (this includes Ryton and Bubbenhall) by the Agent to the Duke of Buccleuch. In practice that is about 6.45am but it varies with the first light of dawn.

(6.45 in 2021)

Anyone is welcome to attend. Many people will be regular attenders and will be bringing their children.

The actual collection from the 25 parishes only lasts about four and a half minutes so do not be late!

Many people will already have been to the local pub, The Queen's Head in Bretford

(CV23 0JY Tel. 024 76542671 www.thequeenshead-bretford.co.uk) for the traditional drink of rum and hot milk. The bar usually opens at 6.00 am All will then return to The Queen's Head for a breakfast and speeches. Please note that breakfast tickets need to be pre-booked directly with the Queen's Head, (breakfast cost is £14.20 for 2021.) Included in the price is a glass of rum and hot milk

with which to toast the health of His Grace and a churchwarden pipe (tobacco supplied). People will be departing by about 8.45am.

Thought for the Month:



Lots of fireworks at this time of year. Diwali, Halloween, November 5.

Ask most people what's special about November 5, and they'll say: Bonfire night. Guy Fawkes night. A few very special people will say: of course, it's the eve of St. Leonard's day, isn't it?

Everyone knows about the gunpowder plot, don't they? Wicked Roman Catholics plotting to blow up the Protestant King James Ist and his peers by putting barrels of gunpowder in the cellars of the House of Lords. Guy Fawkes caught in the act of setting fire to the gunpowder. Arrested and, together with the other conspirators, executed for his crime. Serve them right.

Or was the truth really quite different? Some historians suspect that the plotting was on the Protestant side. A government plot to eliminate the Catholic opposition without arousing the hostility of the population. Guy Fawkes, according to this theory, was set up. He was somehow enticed to the cellar where the barrels of gunpowder had been planted by the government. Planted with the express intent of incriminating the leaders of the Roman Catholic opposition.

The official story, the government-approved version, the one that got into the history books, rests on the evidence of Guy Fawkes himself and another of the alleged conspirators. Both confessed to the crime. But those confessions were exacted under torture.

In fact, immediately after his arrest, Guy Fawkes was subjected to such severe torture that he was unable to speak. The purpose of this torture, a historian former colleague of mine says, may well have been so that he was physically incapable of telling anyone the truth. Or telling a lie for that matter.

All he was capable of doing was signing a confession. A confession prepared, of course, by the people in power. Any other evidence there might have been, was as ruthlessly suppressed by the government as were Guy Fawkes and his friends. Hanged, drawn and quartered for their part in a plot that *perhaps* never existed.

So was Guy Fawkes a villain? Or was he a victim of a regime as totalitarian as Stalin's Russia or Hitler's Germany?

Whatever the rights and wrongs of the historical facts, the Gunpowder Plot which we remember at this time of year is a lasting monument to human hardness and cruelty and lies.

If it's difficult to be sure of the historical facts of the Gunpowder Plot, it's even more difficult when you come to St. Leonard. St. Leonard lived more than a thousand years before Guy Fawkes, so the details of his life are scanty.

Leonard's transparent holiness is said to have impressed the warlike King Clovis so much that Clovis released a thousand prisoners when Leonard asked him to. Another of St. Leonard's legendary exploits was to secure a safe delivery for the pregnant queen. How did he do this? By prayer. St. Leonard got things done by prayer and by non-violence. By his personal holiness.

Guy Fawkes and the government of James I- whichever version of the story you think is more accurate- got things done- or tried to get things done- through violence, brutality and extreme cruelty.


St Leonard got prisoners released, and a pregnant queen brought safely through childbirth in a similar way- not through violence, but through the example of a holy life and through prayer.

Because there are two ways of doing things, aren't there? Two ways of living your life. Of solving difficult problems and getting through seemingly impossible situations. There's Man's way - and there's God's way.

The way of the wise and clever and ruthless, like the politicians in Guy Fawkes time, And there's the way of people like St. Leonard. The people involved in the Gunpowder Plot, on both sides, were trying to get things done in Man's way. They were trying to achieve by human strength what they believed to be good aims- the victory of the true religion, Catholic or Protestant according to your point of view. It would be good, wouldn't it, if we could stop trying to solve life's apparently insoluble problems by applying our human resources to them and thinking that it's all down to us to make things happen through our human effort, using violence and force if necessary, like they did in the days of the Gunpowder Plot.

It would be good if we could turn away from all that and learn to lead a St. Leonard type life, a life of calm dependency on God. A life where we bring all our problems to God in prayer.

There is still time to start on **confirmation preparation** for adults and young people. The PCC has agreed to register with a scheme to recycle printer ink cartridges to raise funds for the church.


There are boxes in Ryton Church Centre and outside the door to the Church Centre, for you to deposit used ink cartridges. Or you can


St. Leonard's, Ryton Christmas Cards.
