Children in Church.

We love having children in our churches, and there is always provision for them at our 9.30 a.m. services at St. Leonard's Church, Ryton. All families with babies and children are sure of a warm welcome whenever they can join us. Families from

Bubbenhall are especially welcome.All Ryton Sunday morning services start **at 9.30 a.m.**, and the pattern is:

2nd Sunday in every month: Village Worship.

The most informal of all our services. We start in the Church Centre (warm and welcoming) with workshop activities for children, and coffee, puzzles and chat for grown ups to get to know one another.

At about 10.00 we move into church for a short and child-centred service. There is no need to be there on the dot of 9.30- people drift in as soon as they can make it.

4th Sunday in every month: Family Service.

An all-age service of readings, songs and activities with everybody young and old in church together. Children always participate in the readings/ drama sketches etc. and several people bring instruments to accompany the songs. (and any other musicians among you and your children would be very welcome to join them) Tea/coffee and cake after the service in the Church Centre.

Ist and 3rd Sundays in every month: Parish Communion with Sunday School.

Tea/coffee and the chance to socialise after every service. Children start the service in church with their parents, and after the first hymn go out for Sunday School activities in the Church Centre, returning to receive a blessing at the time of Communion. Parents are welcome to accompany their little ones to Sunday School and stay with them if they lack confidence at first.

At these services, we also have a robed choir which includes older children (aged about 8 and upwards) and teenagers:

At choir practice we work hard- but each practice only lasts one hour! And we have a brilliant director! Come and join us for fun and fellowship as we work together to produce a good sound.



Thought for the month: From our Rector, the Revd. David Wintle.



People make the mistake of thinking that faith is about what we believe, but faith is not about what we believe, but it is about who we believe. God is not an abstract concept that we assent to. God is personal; he wants us to surrender to him; God is a power; he wants us to lose our lives in him, so that he can give us a new life back. That is what faith is.

Surrendering to another person and losing one's life in another person are not popular concepts, but perhaps I don't quite mean what you think I mean.

I'll try to explain.

Here we are in the middle of the wedding season, although the wedding season this year is a slow starter. But marriage is a good example of the kind of surrender that I mean, a good example of losing one's life so that one might find it. You give yourself to your spouse in marriage, and out of that giving, you gain an entirely new life and a new way of living.

No-one can survive in a marriage that is based on a 50/50 sharing of things, or a measuring out of feelings, thoughts, and actions. Marriage, if it is to work out, is a 100% proposition: everything you have and everything you are you offer to your spouse. It says so in the marriage service. If you got married in church it probably passed you by in a blur – but it's there.

As soon as you hold back, as soon as you count what you have given, or what your partner has given, the marriage begins to fail. As soon as you begin to question what your husband says, as soon as you begin to refuse to help your wife with something because she has not done something for you today, the marriage begins to get shaky.

Marriage is not based on equal sharing; it is not based on tit for tat; it is based on giving everything you have to your partner and trusting them to accept you and love you in return. Throughout the Bible, our relationship to God is described as being like a marriage. We are meant to offer all of our selves to God in trust, much as we are meant to offer all of ourselves to each other in our marriages. And, if we do that, we get back far more than we lose.

In the Bible we read:

Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labour:

If either of them falls down, one can help the other up.

Also, if two lie down together, they will keep warm.

Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves.
