THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH: CORPUS CHRISTI



I remember when I was very little, going to Princethorpe to see the Corpus Christi procession.

I remember little girls about my age, in pretty white dresses, walking along scattering flowers. I really wanted to be able to do that, but my Mum said I couldn't because we were Church of England and only Roman Catholics did that. I had no understanding of what the procession was all about, but I thought it was absolutely lovely, especially for the little girls, and

I rather wished that the Church of England- whatever that might be- had beautiful processions like that too.

Thursday, June 16 is the Feast of Corpus Christi, or, if you prefer: Thanksgiving for Holy Communion.

St. Paul, writing to the Christians at Corinth, probably only about 20 years after the death of Jesus, is already talking about the *tradition* which he has handed on to them. The tradition that Jesus, on the night of his arrest, took bread and wine, gave thanks for them and gave them to his friends, instructing them to eat and drink this bread and wine as a memorial of him.

And using those bold words, those words that have caused puzzlement and even offence:

This is my Body. This is the cup of the new covenant sealed by my Blood.

From St. Paul's words, two things seem to be abundantly clear.

First, that the Eucharist, this eating of the bread and drinking of the wine, was firmly established among the followers of Jesus right from the first. It was already a tradition when Paul, after his conversion, learned about it from the Christian community.

And secondly that for Paul, and for the Christians who handed on that tradition to him, it was not just a matter of eating bread and drinking wine, but of eating the Body and drinking the Blood of Jesus. You can see that by the way Paul says that anyone who eats the bread or drinks the cup unworthily will be guilty of desecrating the Body and Blood of the Lord.

Those bold, shocking words of Jesus: This is my body, this is the cup of my blood: Paul seems to be taking those bold words absolutely literally.

When you eat the bread and drink the wine, he says, you must discern the Body. You must be aware that this is no ordinary bread and wine. This is the Body and Blood of Christ that you are eating and drinking.

Holy Communion. The Body and Blood of Christ.

We thank you for feeding us, we pray after we have received Holy Communion. We thank you for feeding us with the Body and Blood of your Son, Jesus Christ. What are we saying? What was Paul saying? What was Jesus saying?

In Chapter 6 of St. John's Gospel, Jesus is reported as saying:

My flesh is real food; my blood is real drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood dwells continually in me, and I in him.

Many of Jesus's followers left him, the Gospel tell us, when they heard these words. It's easy to see why. The scandal was just too great. Eating human flesh, drinking human blood. The overtones of cannibalism were simply too much for those followers, and it's absolutely understandable that they stopped following him when they heard him talk about eating his flesh and drinking his blood.

And the scandal still remains. It's a shocking idea, isn't it? Shocking and even, perhaps, distasteful. It crosses the strong taboo against cannibalism.

The Eucharist. You can't explain it, you can't fully understand it. All you can do is obey Jesus and do it.

Taste and see. Take whatever Jesus chooses to give you through it. And be thankful.
