Precept for 2021-22

The Parish Council have decided not to increase the Parish Council precept this year, however the change in the tax base had altered. This means a Band D contribution will increase from £56.60 to £57.51, an increase of 1.61%.

Street Lights & Crime Prevention

A car was broken into on Ryton Road in February, and some valuables were stolen. As this part of the village currently has no street lighting, which is key for

crime prevention, the Council have asked Warwick District Council to remedy this as soon as possible. Community Fibre Partnerships OpenReach

Many villagers have responded to the Community Fibre Partnership survey with a view to BT Openreach working with the village to build a customised fibre solution to bring fibre broadband to homes and businesses. Given that ways of working are changing and many of us will be working from home more often, it will be great if the village can have the best provision possible in the future. The threshold numbers of households taking part was reached in January (villagers who took part should have received an email from Gov.uk asking them to confirm that they've agreed to a contract for a new gigabit capable service), so the next stage is that Openreach put a joint funding arrangement forward, where they contribute some of the costs and the community funds the rest. They will also advise whether we can apply for any grants from local authorities or Government to help pay for our part.

Footpath Safety

During the third lockdown, we've all continued to enjoy exploring our local area on foot. However, have had some issues reported to the Parish Council. Firstly, walkers are not using the correct exit from the Church Field path out onto Stoneleigh Road, emerging out through a hedge therefore not visible to motorists or other road users. The stile between the field and the path alongside the Riverside properties has been made much easier to use, so we hope this will encourage walkers to use the correct entrance/exit. Secondly, we have also had concerns from

Parking for Ryton **Pools** Country Park During this pandemic, there has been a regular and dangerous parking issue where visitors have parked along the verge of the A445 to use Ryton Pools Country Park, either because the car parks are full, or to avoid paying for parking.

County Cllr Redford has allocated Recreation Ground a significant part of his road safety budget to fund a series of bollards on the verge (where the Police cones are placed currently) to prevent dangerous parking in the future. Our thanks go to Cllr Redford for this support which will make it much safer for villagers to access Ryton Pools.







Bubbenhall Wood



Many of you will have walked in Bubbenhall Wood, particularly since March 2020. Indeed, some villagers have contributed to the Warwickshire Wildlife "An oral history of Bubbenhall Wood and

Meadow" which is worth watching (www.warwickshirewildlifetrust.org .uk/Bubbenhall.Wood) and is in memory of Peter Wilkins.

Wildlife Warwickshire Trust obtained Bubbenhall Wood (and Meadow – more in another issue) in 2016. The wood is mentioned in the Domesday Book entry for Bubbenhall in 1086 as being 2 furlongs long and wide and worth 50 shillings, so it has been part of the village for a long time.

You can access the wood from Paget's Lane where there is a small members car park and gates, or from the Glebe Farm track off the A445 near the lay by.

Easter Cheesy Breakfast Casserole



Ingredients:

8 slices of bread – cubed,
½ cup butter – melted,
480ml of milk,
½ teaspoon salt,
½ teaspoon mustard,
5 eggs,
225g grated cheddar cheese,
250g diced ham or cooked sausage,
110g mushrooms

Method:

- Grease 9 x 13 glass baking dish.
- Mix bread with melted butter.
- Add cheese, ham or sausage, and mushrooms.
- Place in baking dish.
- Mix and beat eggs then add milk and seasonings.
- Pour over mixture in dish
- Cover with foil and refrigerate overnight
- Remove foil and bake for 1 hour @ 325°F, 170C or Gas mark 3
- Remove from oven.
- Let stand for 10 minutes then serve and enjoy

Grow Your Own

Last year all your fantastic grow and can be harvested a few miner (leeks), mice will probably produce had to be eaten rather leaves at a time. than nurtured for entering in the Flower. Fruit and Produce Show. Let us hope that things will be different this year and that it will be possible for the show to be run. The main thing is get growing since one's own produce always tastes nicer even if it may be a bit imperfect.

There is a lot that can be grown in your garden without needing masses of space. Early potatoes such as Charlotte, which are good for salads and as new potatoes, can be grown in potato containers, tucked around a patio. They need to be watered well in dry periods and benefit from a feed. Cherry tomatoes can be grown in growbags or pots in a sunny spot; Bite Size, Rosella, Sweet Aperitif and Sweet Million are all ones to try. Courgettes need a lot of water but one way of stopping them taking up too much room is to train them to grow upright. This method can be used for Defender and Venus, both long green types.

Wigwams in flower beds (6-8 canes) are suitable for Runner Beans and Climbing French Beans, which have pretty flowers ranging from red, pink, violet and white, as well as producing plenty of beans. Try Enigma Elite and Cobra. Loose-leaf lettuce such as Navara are colourful, easy to

It is not just vegetables that can be fitted in. Rhubarb is a decorative plant that fits into the flower border. Strawberries can grown in planters; just remember to look for slugs and snails when the fruit sets or you won't have any. Fruit trees can be grown in large pots, but to make certain that they do not get too big they need to be grown on a rootstock; this information will be available from the supplier. Cherries, apricots and peaches are self fertile so only one plant is needed, but both apples and pears need a partner to ensure pollination. Family comprising three varieties on one rootstock are ideal if space is limited.

If you have more space in your garden or an allotment then there should be no stopping you growing whatever you want to try, but do remember that you will not be the only thing wanting your Protection against produce. pigeons and other birds, slugs and snails, carrot root fly, allium leaf

Bubbenhall 100 Club

As was announced in previous Newsletters, the 100 Club was forced to suspend operations a year ago as a consequence of the COVID restrictions. But with the lifting of Government restrictions now in prospect we are able to consider plans for a resumption. At the present time these plans are as follows:

- The collections of subscriptions from members to resume by mid-June but with new COVID-sensitive arrangements in place, for example to limit the need for some doorto door collections (details to follow).
- Members subscribing at this time would be entered for 12 monthly draws and any additional draws that are announced from time to time.
- Subscriptions would remain at the same levels as in the past namely £12 per annum and there would be FOUR prizes each month namely £40, £25, £20 and £15. So at least 48 chances to win every year: great odds!
- The first monthly prize draw after the resumption would likely to be in July if possible at an open-air event that is at the planning stage.

All this is of course contingent on the Government's announced plans for the lifting of COVID restrictions remaining on track.

For more than 25 years the 100 Club has represented a source of back-up funding for improvements of Bubbenhall Village Hall (BVH): all 100 Club subscriptions after paying prizes, are available for such purposes. Several further improvements to the BVH are required and it is very much to be hoped that the 100 Club can once more provide support to these when needed.

At the last count we had 177 paid-up members of the Club and we very much hope that most of you will renew your support as we resume.
